The Charcot Foot

The Charcot Foot is a entirely different entity than the neuromuscular disorder Charcot-Marie-Tooth Disease. A Charcot foot is a deformity stemming from the breakdown of the joints of the foot and ankle secondary to a hyperemic response. Although most common in Diabetic patients, it can be found in non-Diabetics as well. The common denominator is concomitant peripheral neuropathy. In it's earliest development a Charcot foot may be mistaken for a sprain or even an infection. A full blown, active Charcot foot is very swollen, red, and hot to the touch. It is difficult to distinguish between an active Charcot foot and osteomyelitis/abscess visually or even radiographically. Typically the Charcot patient will have a normal WBC and no fever and is a way to tell a difference. A bone biopsy is the gold standard for differentiation. One's initial treatment should always err on the side of treating an infection. Treatments include immobilization and strict non-weight bearing until the active stage is resolved. This may take 3 months or more. Bracing and custom shoes are often required to support the new structure of the foot. In some instances Charcot reconstructive surgery is required to recreate a more structurally sound and functional foot. Our patients need to know that with or without surgical intervention a Charcot foot is a LIMB THREATENING CONDITION.

For this reason, we have started a **Charcot Foot Clinic** as part of our practice to help save these limbs. We have 16 years experience treating the Charcot Foot and look forward to helping your patients.
